The Golden Retriever is a medium size dog. They originally came from Scotland, around the early 1800's, used to retrieve shot ducks and game birds during hunting and shooting sports. The original cross was of a yellow coloured Retriever with a Tweed Water Spaniel.

The outer layer is formed by the flat or wavy and fringed. Found only in color, in shades of gold and cream Eventually may have white hairs on his chest

Facts

They were bred to have a soft mouth to retrieve birds undamaged, and have an instinctive love of water. The Golden Retriever has a thick inner coat that provides it ample warmth. The outer coat is sleek and water repellent, and lies flat against the body.

The breed's intelligence and versatility suit the dog well for a variety of roles including guide dog for the blind, hunting dog, illegal drug and explosives detector, and search and rescue dog. Because of their loyal and gentle temperament, golden retrievers are are popular family pets, with a friendly and eager to please nature.

How To Train A Puppy

Golden Retriever puppy training should start as soon as you bring your puppy home, but only if the dog is old enough and has been properly socialized. If the puppy is not yet 10 weeks old or if it has not be properly socialized with people and other dogs, make sure you do this first to avoid the creation of any excess aggression issues.



Because of their innate curiosity and courageous nature, a Golden Retriever will try to explore as much as possible. Teach them early not to chase cars, to stop at the curb and to make sure they don't run away from you in public. Never take a Golden Retriever off its leash until you can be sure it will return upon being called and not run too far from you. The risks are higher with Golden Retrievers than with many other small breeds. Proper Golden Retriever puppy training may seem a little tougher than normal when you first get your new friend, but eventually you'll find that a Golden Retriever is among the most loyal, attentive dogs you could possibly own.
