ROTTWEILER

The Rottweiler is a medium to large size breed of domestic dog.

Rottweilers are a relatively healthy, disease-free breed.

Rottweilers have been banned in some municipalities, and they are sometimes targeted as dangerous dogs by legislation. Technically a "medium / large" breed, according to the FCI standard the Rottweiler stands 61 to 69 cm (24"-27") at the withers for males, 56 to 63 cm (22"-25") for females, and the weight must be between 50 to 60 kg (110-132 lbs) for males and between 35-48 kg (77-105 lbs) for females. Weight must be relative to height.



The dogs were known as "Rottweil butchers' dogs" (German: Rottweiler Metzgerhund) because they were used to herd livestock and pull carts laden with butchered meat and other products to market.

The coat is double coated, Short, hard and thick

The color is normally black and tan or black and mahogany



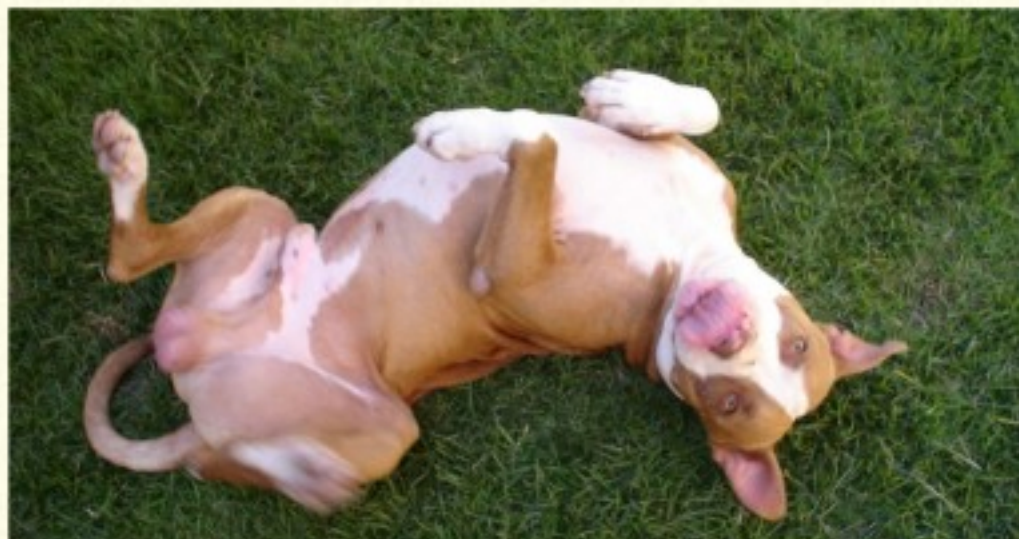
PIT BULL

The term pit bull is used in reference to a number of certain breeds of dog – namely, the American

Terrier, the Staffordshire Terrier and any crosses between the three.

The American Pit Bull Terrier was bred for the quality of fighting dogs or working terriers of eagerness despite the threat of substantive injury, strength, and athleticism.

It is recognized that owners are the problem, and not the genetics of the dog.

History:

Although pit bulls were all created with similar cross-breeding between bulldogs and terriers, each individual breed within the type has a distinct history. The US Humane Society estimated that in 2009 that there were over 79.2 million owned dogs in the United States;[3] however, the number of pit bull-type dogs has not been reliably determined.
